The Board of Trustees of the Village of Stickney met in regular session on Tuesday, March 6, 2018, at 7:04 p.m. in the Stickney Village Hall, 6533 W. Pershing Road, Stickney, Illinois.

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees were present: Trustees Hrejsa, Kapolnek, Milenkovic, Savopoulos and Torres Absent: Trustee White

Trustee Milenkovic moved, duly seconded by Trustee Savopoulos to approve the minutes of the previous regular session on Tuesday, February 20, 2018.

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees voted:

Ayes: Trustee Hrejsa, Kapolnek, Milenkovic, Savopoulos and Torres

Nays: None

Absent: Trustee White

Mayor Walik declared the motion carried.

Trustee Savopoulos moved, duly seconded by Trustee Torres that the bills, approved by the various committees of the Board, be approved for payment, and to approve warrants which authorize the Village Treasurer to draw checks to pay the bills, to be signed by the authorized signers, as provided for by the Ordinances of the Village of Stickney.

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees voted:

Mayor Walik declared the motion carried.

Prior to the vote, Treasurer Paul Nosek provided a summary indicating the source of funds used to pay the bills and the totals to be approved.

Trustee Savopoulos moved, duly seconded by Trustee Milenkovic to pass and approve Ordinance 2018-06, "An Ordinance Amending Section 7.01 of the Village of Stickney Zoning Ordinance—1980, Village of Stickney, IL Regarding Permitted Uses in the Single Family District"

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees voted:

Mayor Walik declared the motion carried.

Prior to the vote Trustee Savopoulos remarked that this was added because of Airbnb rentals. There was a house here on the West side of the Village that was holding parties there and they were just renting it out. We added text to the ordinance to tighten it up.

Trustee Savopoulos moved, seconded by Trustee Hrejsa to Pass and Approve Ordinance 2018-07, "An Ordinance Amending Section 4.14 of the Village of Stickney Zoning Ordinance—1980, Village of Stickney, Illinois Regarding Land Divisions"

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees voted:

Ayes: Trustee Hrejsa, Kapolnek, Milenkovic, Savopoulos and Torres

Absent: Trustee White

Mayor Walik declared the motion carried.

Village Attorney Mike Del Galdo explained that on item 6 this cements the Village's regulatory authority. There is a bill in the General Assembly pending for the last year that would prohibit municipalities from regulating industries like Airbnbs. It would take away local control and restrictions. The Mayor, Trustee Savopoulos and the Zoning Board wanted to act quickly to protect the residents so if the state did pass it we would have our ordinance in place. Attorney Del Galdo then explained that item 7 is just cleaning up the zoning code. The codes are old and in the course of this year we will be updating these very old codes.

Trustee Kapolnek moved, duly seconded by Trustee Savopoulos to Approve Resolution 04-2018, "A Resolution Authorizing and Approving a Certain Agreement with Waste Management of Illinois, Inc. For the Village of Stickney"

Upon the roll call, the following Trustees voted:

Ayes: Trustee Hrejsa, Kapolnek, Milenkovic, Savopoulos and Torres

Nays: None

Absent: Trustee White

Mayor Walik declared the motion carried.

The mayor explained due to the increasing cost of labor, due to the cost that we lost \$900,000 in the last three years, due to the cost of two brand new garbage trucks, the Village and the Trustees cannot come up with \$1 million. To save on materials, fuel, repair costs we are going to outsource our garbage to Waste Management. It is a partnership with Waste Management. We had a committee together and selected Waste Management. This is going to be a great partnership. This board and myself, Public Works Supervisor Joe Lopez, police and fire if they need to help out. Nothing will interrupt this transition. Waste Management has already done the survey of the Village. They have a map and times for pickups. The information will come out on our web site, through Waste Management, and a partnership letter. Our Public Works Department will assist Waste Management for the first couple of weeks. We want this to be a nice transition.

At this point the people representing Waste Management spoke to the audience. Mr. Vaughn Kuerschner, Public Sector Representative, addressed the audience. He introduced Jim Gannon, District Manager from the Stickney facility. The Stickney facility will be picking up our refuse, recycling and yard waste on Wednesday, Thursdays and Fridays. All services will be done entirely on the same day. They are excited to have this opportunity. A draft of the brochure was given to the Mayor. A description of the services is explained in the handout. There will be a web site created specifically for the Village of Stickney. People can go in this web site if they have any questions. An informative letter will go out to the residents at the end of the week. Additional information was provided by Jim Gannon who has been with Waste Management for 23 years. We were told that the small blue recycling bin is being phased out. People are being asked to buy one of the tall recycling bins from the Village. The Mayor informed us that the Waste Management trucks have trackers. If you have a complaint, Waste Management can track their trucks. Stickney will be double checking during the transition. The Mayor asked Jim Gannon what the cost of a new truck is. He told us that he purchases all the trucks at his facility. He mentioned that their trucks are fueled by Natural Gas. A brand new truck is between \$300,000 to \$335,000 for one truck. A top of the line front loader with all the bells and whistles is \$354,000. Trustee Savopoulos reminded people that Stickney will have a truck available to pick up bulky items like TVs or couches and tires.

Trustee Savopoulos moved, duly seconded by Trustee Hrejsa to Approve Resolution 05-2018, "A Resolution Appointing a Certain Individual to the position of Deputy Clerk for the Village of Stickney"

Mayor Walik declared the motion carried.

The Mayor explained that Clerk Audrey McAdams will be out in April and Beth will be helping out with the clerk position.

MAYOR'S REPORT: Mayor Walik mentioned that if you have a friend that has questions about the Waste Management transition, tell them to stop by. It will save money and wear and tear. No one will lose their jobs. It will give our guys more time to do their Public Works jobs like cleaning our parks, cleaning our streets or painting our curbs. They might be able to fix a small projects or fixing a curb or sidewalk. We will be keeping our Village clean and fresh.

<u>CLERK'S REPORT:</u> The next board meeting will be Wednesday, March 21, 2018 due to the Gubernatorial Primary Election on March 20. She went on to explain the early voting site. More information was given about finding out about the candidates, including the judges.

TRUSTEE REPORTS:

<u>Trustee Kapolnek</u> reported on a Village Sponsored dance on March 22, 2018 to be held at Saint Pius. This Sunday there will be a spaghetti luncheon at St. Pius X Church.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS:

Public Works Supervisor Joe Lopez assured the audience that no one in Public Works will lose their job. The only way that could happen is if people don't do their job or something bad happens. He explained that the Village is being split into three zones. There are seven of us. Each zone will have at least two guys. Another one will be a floater. Having zones will be a better fit for the Village. More work can be done. It will be easier to track the work. The guys have been assured that they will have a job. Supervisor Lopez explained that he will enforce the Village conditions. It will be work hard and be accountable. The street sweeping will take place on Monday and Tuesday. Leaf cleaning will be on Monday and Tuesday. He mentioned getting a leaf picker-upper instead of using the truck with the brush. The Mayor said there will be a notice going out on that. There will be Code Red. It is about keeping our streets and alleys clean. We are not out to write tickets. The first garbage pickup will be April 4. The first street cleaning will be April 9. Remember that Public Works is the backup to Waste Management.

Treasurer Paul Nosek explained that he went back to 2008 and discovered that revenue generated in garbage fees was about the same as 2017 but the cost just kept going up. The budget season is starting. He will be meeting with all our department heads. The numbers will be ready to go the last week in April. On March 19th we will start accepting Visa. We have two new ATM machines. One is in the Village Hall and one in the Police Station. It will help us with people who don't have a credit card to pay their bills. The Mayor injected the loss we experienced in garbage. The treasurer quoted that in FYE 2017 the loss to the Village was \$271,558.00; in 2016 it was \$351,190.00; 2015 it was \$344,000; 2014 it was \$322,792; 2013 it was \$294,814; and going back to 2008 it was \$232,766: We have been losing money on garbage for a long time.

The Mayor asked for the Boot totals for February. Deputy Chief Jaczak explained that during the colder weather they focused their attention to Booting. That would be vehicles in town that had more than five outstanding tickets that they hadn't paid which were already past the court date. They had time to pay and they chose not to or couldn't. For the month of February we brought in \$45,000.00. Tickets and fines would have never been collected had it not been for the Boot program. Now that it is warming up the focus will shift to traffic. In addition, our most recent officer Michael Ciccone started on February 15. He was a former Lyons Police Officer. He had an abbreviated training and is excelling and doing a great job. We are in the process of hiring and vetting two additional police officers who will be going to the Chicago Police Academy. Deputy Chief Jaczak told us the he was the first one to go for his Narcan training. All officers will be trained in using Narcan which is an anti-opioid for overdoses. All officers will be carrying two in their vests. In addition, we are getting trained in tourniquet usage. This is all happening with the cooperation of Homeland Security to certify two of our officers and who will train everybody else.

Police Chief Babich added in a comment concerning the one auto theft that we had. A lady gave her car to a mechanic she didn't really know. He was not reputable. It put us in a position to have to put it in as stolen. He gave it up. The other thefts we have are a majority at the Jewel. They refused to change procedures of where the liquor is located. It makes it very hard for us to keep the thefts down.

ORDINANCE NO. 2018-08

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-196 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS REGARDING VEHICLE IMMOBILIZATION, TOWING AND IMPOUNDING

WHEREAS, the Village of Stickney (the "Village") is a home rule municipal corporation in accordance with Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") are committed to ensuring the health, safety and welfare of individuals residing in, working in and visiting the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Municipal Code, Village of Stickney, Illinois (the "Village Code") currently imposes an impoundment fee of Five Hundred and No/100 U.S. Dollars (\$500.00) when a vehicle is used in connection with certain offenses, including driving under the influence of alcohol, drugs or other intoxicating substances (the "Impoundment Fee"); and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities recognize the need to deter such offenses in order to ensure the safety of drivers and pedestrians within the Village; and

WHEREAS, based upon the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is in the best interests of the Village and its residents to amend Chapter 14, Section 14-196 of the Village Code to increase the Impoundment Fee as set forth herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

SECTION 1. INCORPORATION CLAUSE.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend Chapter 14, Section 14-196 of the Village Code to increase the Impoundment Fee, and to authorize the President or his designee to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE II.

AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-196 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS

SECTION 3.0 AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-196.

That the Village Code is hereby amended, notwithstanding any provision, ordinance, resolution or Village Code section to the contrary, by amending Chapter 14, Section 14-196 as follows:

14-196. - Conduct prohibited.

- (a) A motor vehicle used in connection with any of the following violations may be subject to immediate seizure and/or impoundment by the village and the owner of record of said vehicle shall be liable to the village for any administrative penalty of \$500.00\$750.00, plus any applicable towing fees.
 - (1) Driving under the influence of alcohol, other drug or drugs, intoxicating compound(s) or any combination thereof, or possession of drugs or intoxicating compound(s) as provided by the Illinois Compiled Statutes (625 ILCS 5/11-501(a)).
 - (2) Driving while driver's license, permit or privilege to operate a motor vehicle is suspended or revoked, pursuant to the Illinois Complied Statutes (625 ILCS 5/6-303) or is suspended or revoked for any other reason and the vehicle is being operated in violation of 625 ILCS 5/6-303.
 - (3) Driving without a valid driver's license pursuant to Illinois Compiled Statutes (625 ILCS 5/6-101).
 - (4) Arrest for any felony offense pursuant to the Illinois Compiled Statutes (720 ILCS).
 - (5) The operation of any motor vehicle with open alcohol in violation of 625 ILCS 5/11-502.
 - (6) Any vehicle being operated or having been operated while the operator or occupants of the vehicle are in the commission of or fleeing from the commission of a crime constituting a charge of a class A misdemeanor, or any felony.
 - (7) An accident involved motor vehicle.
 - (8) A hazardous vehicle.
 - (9) A derelict motor vehicle, including any vehicle which has been immobilized for 72 hours or more pursuant to section 14-195.10.

- (10) Any motor vehicle that is parked on a public way, alley or a loading zone in violation of sections 14-143, 14-145, 14-148, 14-150, or 14-154 of this Code.
- (11) Any motor vehicle that is illegally parked in a tow away zone.
- (12) Any motor vehicle that is inoperable due to the arrest of the owner or operator.
- (13) Any motor vehicle or motor vehicle displaying a license plate that has ten or more tickets for parking and/or traffic violations when no bond or payment has been received for the outstanding violations.

SECTION 3.1. OTHER ACTIONS AUTHORIZED.

The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required to carry out, give effect to and consummate the amendments contemplated by this Ordinance and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith, including, but not limited to, the installation of any street or parking signs as contemplated herein. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village are specifically authorized and directed to draft and disseminate any and all necessary forms or notices to be utilized in connection with the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE III. HEADINGS, SAVINGS CLAUSES, PUBLICATION, EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 4. HEADINGS.

The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for the convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and should any provision of this Ordinance be determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said provision shall be excluded and deemed inoperative, unenforceable and as though not provided for herein and all other provisions shall remain unaffected, unimpaired, valid and in full force and effect.

SECTION 6. SUPERSEDER.

All code provisions, ordinances, resolutions, rules and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.

SECTION 7. PUBLICATION.

A full, true and complete copy of this Ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form or in a newspaper published and of general circulation within the Village as provided by the Illinois Municipal Code, as amended.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall be effective and in full force ten (10) days after its passage, approval and publication in accordance with Illinois law.

ORDINANCE NO. 2018-09

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 62, SECTION 62-31 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS REGARDING THE APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS FOR GARAGE SALES

WHEREAS, the Village of Stickney (the "Village") is a home rule municipal corporation in accordance with Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") are committed to ensuring the health, safety and welfare of Village residents; and

WHEREAS, the Village currently regulates house, garage, rummage, attic and basement sales (collectively, "Garage Sales"); and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities recognize the need to update the Garage Sale regulations (the "Regulations") from time to time; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities wish to reduce the waiting period for Garage Sale applications as set forth herein; and

WHEREAS, based upon the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary, advisable and in the best interests of the Village and its residents to amend Chapter 62, Section 62-31 of the Municipal Code, Village Of Stickney, Illinois (the "Village Code") as set forth below;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

SECTION 1. INCORPORATION CLAUSE.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend Chapter 62, Section 62-31 of the Village Code regulating Garage Sales within the Village and to authorize the President or his designee to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE II.

AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 62, SECTION 62-31 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS

SECTION 3.0. AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 62, SECTION 62-31.

That the Village Code is hereby amended, notwithstanding any provision, ordinance, resolution or Village Code section to the contrary, by amending Chapter 62, Section 62-31 as follows:

Sec. 62-31. - Permit.

- (a) Required. No person shall engage in or conduct a garage, rummage, attic, basement or house sale from any residence, store, structure, or lot, in the village without first having obtained a special permit for such sale from the village clerk. No permit shall be issued unless application therefor is made no less than 14 days 3 business days prior to the date of the proposed sale.
- (b) *Terms and conditions for issuance.* No special permit will be issued unless there is full compliance with the following terms and conditions:
 - (1) The applicant-permittee must be the owner of the premises where such sale is to be held.
 - (2) The sale will involve only the personal property items owned by the applicant-permittee or members of the household.
 - (3) No such sale has been conducted by the same applicant or from the same premises during the preceding 12-month period. Such permit shall be valid only for the particular sale and premises designated thereon and shall be nontransferable.
 - (4) No sale items shall be located and no sales activities shall be conducted on any public sidewalk, or other public property.
 - (5) Signs advertising such sale may be located in the front yard area of the premises, and no such sale signs, handbills or other advertising matter shall be located or posted upon any public building, utility post, lamppost, or public property in the village. Notwithstanding the foregoing, signs may be posted on public parkways for not more than forty-eight (48) hours.
 - (6) The sale shall be limited to a consecutive period of not more than two days and shall be conducted only during the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.
 - (7) The sale shall be conducted without the use of outdoor loud speakers or other amplification equipment.
 - (8) The sale shall be conducted in accordance with all other laws or ordinances in effect in the village.
 - (9) There shall be no fee charge for this special permit.

- (c) The last Saturday and Sunday of July are hereby designated annually as a village-wide garage sale. No permits shall be required. All other provisions of this section shall apply.
- (d) *Penalty.* Any person found to have violated the provisions of this section shall be fined not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$100.00, and a separate violation shall be deemed committed on each day upon which a violation occurs or continues. Failure to remove signs from public or private property shall constitute a violation of this section, and violators shall be subject to a \$50.00 minimum fine.

SECTION 3.1. OTHER ACTIONS AUTHORIZED.

The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required to carry out, give effect to and consummate the amendments contemplated by this Ordinance and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village are specifically authorized and directed to draft and disseminate any and all necessary forms or notices to be utilized in connection with the intent of this Ordinance.

WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") are committed to ensuring the health, safety and welfare of Village residents; and

WHEREAS, the alley located behind the 6800 block of Pershing Road (the "Alley") allowed for the movement of traffic in both eastbound and westbound directions; and

WHEREAS, in order to provide for the safe movement of vehicular and pedestrian traffic, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is in the best interests of the Village and its residents to allow only westbound traffic on the Alley from Oak Park Avenue to Grove Avenue; and

WHEREAS, it is understood that additional steps need to be taken to ensure that the traffic control signs are properly installed and maintained on the Alley; and

WHEREAS, based upon the foregoing, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary, advisable and in the best interests of the Village and its residents to amend Chapter 14, Section 14-84 of the Municipal Code, Village Of Stickney, Illinois (the "Village Code") as set forth below;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

SECTION 1. INCORPORATION CLAUSE.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend Chapter 14, Section 14-84 of the Village Code to allow only westbound traffic on the Alley as set forth herein and to authorize the President or his designee to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE II.

AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-84 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS

SECTION 3.0. AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-84.

That the Village Code is hereby amended, notwithstanding any provision, ordinance, resolution or Village Code section to the contrary, by amending Chapter 14, Section 14-84 as follows:

Sec. 14-84. – One-way roadways.

- (a) Upon a roadway designated and sign-posted for one-way traffic, a vehicle shall be driven only in the direction designated.
- (b) The following streets shall be one-way in the direction indicated:

42nd Street, between Harlem Avenue and the alley located between Harlem and Maple Avenues will be westbound.

43rd Street, between Scoville Avenue and East Avenue will be westbound.

43rd Street, between Harlem Avenue and the alley located between Harlem and Maple Avenues will be westbound.

44th Street, between Harlem Avenue and the alley located between Harlem and Maple Avenues will be westbound.

Clarence Avenue, between 39th Street and 41st Street, southbound.

Clinton Avenue, between 39th Street and 45th Street, northbound.

East avenue, between 43rd Street and 41st Street, northbound.

Elmwood Avenue between 39th Street and 43rd Street, northbound.

Euclid Avenue between 39th Street and 41st Street, southbound.

Grove Avenue between 45th Street and the south line of the first alley south of 39th Street, southbound.

Gunderson Avenue, between 39th Street and 43rd Street, southbound.

Home Avenue, between 39th Street and 45th Street, southbound.

Maple Avenue between 41st Street and 45th Street, northbound.

Scoville Avenue, between 39th Street and 41st Street, northbound.

Scoville Avenue, between 41st Street and 43rd Street, southbound.

Wenonah Avenue between 41st Street and 45th Street, northbound.

Wesley Avenue, between 39th Street and 41st Street, northbound.

Wisconsin Avenue between 41st Street and 45th Street, southbound.

(c) The following alleys shall be one way in the direction indicated:

The north and south public alley located in the block bounded by Harlem Avenue on the west, Wisconsin Avenue on the east, 40th Street on the north and 40th Place on the south, northbound.

The north and south public alley located in the block bounded by Harlem Avenue on the west, Wisconsin Avenue on the east, 40th Place on the north and 41st Street on the south, northbound.

The east and west bound public alley located at the rear of the Stickney Village Hall and Police Station bounded by Scoville Avenue on the east and East Avenue on the west, eastbound.

The east and west bound public alley located at the rear of the 6800 block of Pershing Road, bounded by Oak Park Avenue on the east and Grove Avenue on the west, westbound.

SECTION 3.1. OTHER ACTIONS AUTHORIZED.

The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required to carry out, give effect to and consummate the amendments contemplated by this Ordinance, including taking all necessary steps to ensure the proper installation and continuing maintenance of the traffic control signs located on the Alley, and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village are specifically authorized and directed to draft and disseminate any and all necessary forms or notices to be utilized in connection with the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE III. HEADINGS, SAVINGS CLAUSES, PUBLICATION, EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 4. HEADINGS.

The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for the convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and should any provision of this Ordinance be determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said provision shall be excluded and deemed inoperative,

unenforceable and as though not provided for herein and all other provisions shall remain unaffected, unimpaired, valid and in full force and effect.

SECTION 6. SUPERSEDER.

All code provisions, ordinances, resolutions, rules and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.

SECTION 7. PUBLICATION.

A full, true and complete copy of this Ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form or in a newspaper published and of general circulation within the Village as provided by the Illinois Municipal Code, as amended.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall be effective and in full force ten (10) days after its passage and approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 2018-12

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-148 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS REGARDING PARKING

WHEREAS, the Village of Stickney (the "Village") is a home rule municipal corporation in accordance with Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Village Board" and with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") are committed to ensuring the health, safety and welfare of Village residents; and

WHEREAS, the Village regularly conducts street cleaning operations from April 1 to November 30 annually; and

WHEREAS, the Municipal Code, Village Of Stickney, Illinois (the "Village Code") currently sets forth specific days for street sweeping operations; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary, advisable and in the best interests of the Village and its residents to amend Chapter 14, Section 14-148 of the Village Code to change the days set forth in the Village Code for street sweeping operations; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

SECTION 1. INCORPORATION CLAUSE.

The Corporate Authorities hereby find that all of the recitals hereinbefore stated as contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do hereby, by reference, incorporate and make them part of this Ordinance as legislative findings.

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend Chapter 14, Section 14-148 of the Village Code to change the days set forth in the Village Code for street sweeping operations and to authorize the President or his designee to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE II.

AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-148 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE, VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, ILLINOIS

SECTION 3.0. AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 14, SECTION 14-148.

That the Village Code is hereby amended, notwithstanding any provision, ordinance, resolution or Village Code section to the contrary, by amending Chapter 14, Section 14-148 as set forth below:

Sec. 14-148. - Parking during street cleaning operations.

- (a) It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on any public street or portion thereof in the village at any time from April 1 to November 30, when such streets are being cleaned as follows:
 - (1) On Thursdays Mondays between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.
 - a. On the north side of all streets and public through fares extending in a general easterly and westerly direction; and
 - b. On the west side of all streets and public through fares extending in a generally northerly and southerly direction.
 - (2) On Fridays Tuesdays between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.
 - a. On the south side of all streets and public through fares extending in a generally easterly and westerly direction; and
 - b. On the east side of all street and public through fares extending in a generally northerly and southerly direction.
- (b) It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on Pershing Road or portion thereof in the village at any time from April 1, through November 30 when Pershing Road is being cleaned as follows:
 - (1) On Fridays between 5:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m.
- (c) When snowfall measures two inches or more, the snow removal regulations will supersede the street sweeping regulations.

SECTION 3.1. OTHER ACTIONS AUTHORIZED.

The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required to carry out, give effect to and consummate the amendments contemplated by this Ordinance and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith. The officers, employees and/or agents of the Village are specifically authorized and directed to draft and

disseminate any and all necessary forms or notices to be utilized in connection with the intent of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE III. HEADINGS, SAVINGS CLAUSES, PUBLICATION, EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 4. HEADINGS.

- WHEREAS, the Village of Stickney (the "Village") is a home rule municipal corporation in accordance with Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and
- WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and
- WHEREAS, the Village's Police Department (the "Police Department") protects the public by responding to criminal activity and other emergencies; and
- WHEREAS, to ensure the continued efficient operation of the Police Department, the Police Department has determined that it is in need of three (3) additional vehicles; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Village's Fire Department (the "Fire Department") protects the public by responding to fires and other emergencies within the Village; and
- WHEREAS, to ensure the continued efficient operation of the Fire Department, the Fire Department has determined that it is in need of one (1) additional vehicle; and
- WHEREAS, the Police Department and Fire Department (together, the "Departments") have provided a recommendation (the "Recommendation"), incorporated herein by reference, that the Village purchase three (3) 2018 Ford Utility Interceptor AWD vehicles for the Police Department and one (1) 2018 Ford Utility Interceptor AWD vehicle for the Fire Department (collectively, the "Vehicles"); and
- **WHEREAS,** Currie Motors ("Currie"), provided the Village with proposals for the purchase of the Vehicles (the "Proposals"), attached hereto and incorporated herein as Group Exhibit A; and
- WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Board" and with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") deem it advisable and necessary for the operation of the Department and the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Village to purchase the Vehicles; and
- WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have determined that it is necessary, advisable, and in the best interests of the Village and its residents to

take all steps necessary to purchase the Vehicles in accordance with the terms of the Proposals;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

SECTION 1: RECITALS. The facts and statements contained in the preamble to this Ordinance are found to be true and correct and are hereby adopted as part of this Ordinance.

SECTION 2: PURPOSE. The purpose of this Ordinance is to authorize the purchase of the Vehicles in accordance with the terms of the Proposals, and to authorize the President or his designee to take all necessary steps to effectuate the intent of this Ordinance.

SECTION 3: AUTHORIZATION. The Board hereby authorizes the purchase of the Vehicles in accordance with the terms of the Proposals; waives any bidding requirements related to the purchase of the Vehicles; authorizes and directs the President or his designee to execute any and all necessary documentation to effectuate the same, with such insertions, omissions and changes as shall be approved by the President and the Village Attorney; and ratifies any additional actions taken to effectuate the intent of this Ordinance. The Board further authorizes the President or his designee to execute any and all additional documentation that may be necessary to carry out the intent of this Ordinance. The Village Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to attest to and countersign any documentation as may be necessary to carry out and effectuate the purpose of this Ordinance. The Village Clerk is also authorized and directed to affix the Seal of the Village to such documentation as is deemed necessary. To the extent that any requirement of bidding would be applicable to the Vehicles described herein, the same is hereby waived.

ORDINANCE NO. 2018-<u>14</u>

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING AND APPROVING AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY AND LYONS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT 103 FOR THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY

WHEREAS, the Village of Stickney (the "Village") is a home rule municipal corporation in accordance with Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs, and to review, interpret and amend its ordinances, rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 10 of the Constitution of the State of Illinois, adopted in 1970, expressly permits units of local government and school districts to jointly obtain or share services and to exercise, combine or transfer their powers or functions, in any manner not otherwise prohibited by law or ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Intergovernmental Cooperation Act (5 ILCS 220/1, et seq.) (the "Act") authorizes public agencies, which include units of local government and school districts, to jointly enjoy and/or exercise powers, privileges, functions or authority with other public agencies, except where specifically and expressly prohibited by law; and

WHEREAS, the Act authorizes public agencies to enter into intergovernmental agreements with other public agencies; and

WHEREAS, the Village and Lyons Elementary School District 103 (the "District") are public agencies under the laws of the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, State and federal law impose certain responsibilities on local law enforcement agencies and schools to share information regarding potential threats and the criminal activity of minors in order to protect the safety of students and school staff; and

WHEREAS, the Village and the District (together, the "Parties") desire to enter into and approve an intergovernmental agreement (the "Agreement"), attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit A, whereby the Stickney Police Department (the "Police Department") and the District will share information regarding potential threats to the safety of students and school staff as well as information regarding the criminal activities of minors in conformance with State and federal law; and

WHEREAS, the Village President (the "President") and the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Board," and together with the President, the "Corporate Authorities") have determined that it is necessary, advisable and in the best interests of the Village and its residents to enter into and approve an agreement with substantially the same terms as the terms of the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the President is authorized to enter into and the Village Attorney (the "Attorney") is authorized to revise agreements for the Village making such insertions, omissions and changes as shall be approved by the President and the Attorney;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

SECTION 1: RECITALS. The facts and statements contained in the preamble to this Ordinance are found to be true and correct and are hereby adopted as part of this Ordinance.

SECTION 2: PURPOSE. The purpose of this Ordinance is to authorize the President or his designee to enter into the Agreement whereby the Police Department and the District will share information regarding potential threats to the safety of students and school staff as well as information regarding the criminal activities of minors in conformance with State and federal law and to further authorize the President or his designee to take all steps necessary to carry out the terms and intent of this Ordinance and to ratify any steps taken to effectuate those goals.

SECTION 3: AUTHORIZATION. The Board hereby authorizes and directs the President or his designee to authorize, enter into and approve the Agreement in accordance with its terms, or any modifications thereof, and to ratify any and all previous action taken to effectuate the intent of this Ordinance. The Board further authorizes and directs the President or his designee to execute the Agreement with such insertions, omissions and changes as shall be approved by the President and the Attorney. The Village Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to attest to and countersign the Agreement and any other documentation as may be necessary to carry out and effectuate the purpose of this Ordinance. The Village Clerk is also authorized and directed to affix the Seal of the Village to such documentation as is deemed necessary. The officers, agents and/or employees of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required by the Village to carry out, give effect to and consummate the purpose of this Ordinance and shall take all action necessary in conformity therewith.

SECTION 4. HEADINGS. The headings of the articles, sections, paragraphs and subparagraphs of this Ordinance are inserted solely for the convenience of reference and form no substantive part of this Ordinance nor should they be used in any interpretation or construction of any substantive provision of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and should any provision of this Ordinance be determined to be in conflict with any law, statute or regulation by a court of competent jurisdiction, said provision shall be excluded and deemed inoperative, unenforceable and as though not provided for herein and all other provisions shall remain unaffected, unimpaired, valid and in full force and effect.

SECTION 6. SUPERSEDER. All code provisions, ordinances, resolutions, rules and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.

SECTION 7. PUBLICATION. A full, true and complete copy of this Ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form or in a newspaper published and of general circulation within the Village as provided by the Illinois Municipal Code, as amended.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be effective and in full force immediately upon passage and approval as provided by law.

EXHIBIT A

RECIPROCAL REPORTING INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE VILLAGE OF STICKNEY AND THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF LYONS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT 103

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between the VILLAGE OF STICKNEY, Cook County, Illinois ("VILLAGE"), an Illinois Municipal Corporation, and THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF LYONS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DISTRICT 103, Cook County, Illinois ("DISTRICT"), an Illinois Public School District (collectively, the "Parties").

WHEREAS, this Agreement has been prepared to comply with Sections 10-20.14 and 22-20 of the Illinois School Code (105 ILCS 5/10-20.14, 5/22-20), Section 1-7 of the Juvenile Court Act of 1987 (705 ILCS 405/1-7), Section 6(a)(6.5) of the Illinois School Student Records Act (105 ILCS 10/6(a)(6,5)) and the Family Educational and Privacy Rights Act (20 U.S.C. 1232(g)); and

WHEREAS, DISTRICT and VILLAGE desire to approve and enter into a reciprocal reporting agreement pursuant to State and federal laws that imposed certain reporting requirements on local law enforcement agencies and public schools to enhance the cooperation, reporting and communications to improve the flow of information between educators and law enforcement personnel relating to violent or criminal activity by minor students in an effort to rehabilitate the offender, but also to protect the other students and school employees; and

WHEREAS, this Agreement is entered into and maintained in order to foster cooperation and improve the flow of information between DISTRICT and VILLAGE's local law enforcement agency (being the Stickney Police Department); and

WHEREAS, the cooperation and flow of information is essential to providing the safe, healthy and violence-free school environment to which all students are entitled, and which all students need to thrive and learn; and

WHEREAS, this Agreement is established after discussion among the undersigned, and with the input of DISTRICT's parent-teacher advisory committees, resulting in a consensus; and

WHEREAS, DISTRICT and VILLAGE need to have access to activities of minor students in and out of school, so that they may work together in an efficient manner to prevent, eliminate and discourage acts of crime, violence and intimidation, to promote the maintenance of discipline and safety in the schools, to promote safety in the community, and to facilitate the rehabilitation of students; and

WHEREAS, DISTRICT and VILLAGE are authorized to enter into this Agreement pursuant to Article VII, Section 10(a) of the Illinois Constitution of 1970 and the Intergovernmental Cooperation Act (5 ILCS 220/1 et seq.), and they have each determined that the approval of and entering into this Agreement is in the best interests of the public and the minor students who attend and the employees who work at DISTRICT.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and the mutual promises herein

contained, it is hereby mutually agreed by and between DISTRICT and VILLAGE as follows:

- 1. DISTRICT shall provide the Chief of Police of the Stickney Police Department (hereinafter "Police Chief") with a list of administrators to be contacted as needed. The list will contain regular and emergency telephone numbers for the administrators and will identify the particular types of problems for which particular administrators are to be contacted. The administrators identified in the list shall be considered the "Appropriate School Official," for purposes of Section 1-7(A)(8) of the Juvenile Court Act. 705 ILCS 405/1-7(A)(8).
- 2. The Police Chief shall provide DISTRICT with the names and titles of a primary contact (generally the assigned School Resource Officer) and two back-up contacts, who will have the primary responsibility for implementing these guidelines on behalf of the Stickney Police Department. Any person so designated by the Police Chief shall be considered an "Appropriate Law Enforcement Representative."
- 3. DISTRICT and Police Chief may, as they deem necessary and upon written notification, designate different persons to the respective positions of "Appropriate School Official" and "Appropriate Law Enforcement Representative."
- 4. Any Appropriate School Official and Appropriate Law Enforcement Official (collectively, the "Appropriate Officials") may communicate verbally with each other as deemed necessary. Said officials will arrange meetings, as needed, between school officials and individuals representing law enforcement to share information regarding criminal offenses committed by students consistent with this Agreement and to otherwise facilitate and review enforcement of this Agreement. Information and records shared at such meetings may be verbally communicated among said officials, except that Law Enforcement Records, as defined in Section 9(A), below, must be provided in writing. Information in written form may be transmitted among the Appropriate Officials by any agreed-upon method, including, but not limited to, United States mail, personal delivery or facsimile transmission, provided security safeguards are in place to ensure confidentiality.
- 5. DISTRICT and the Stickney Police Department acknowledge and agree to adhere to their statutory reporting responsibilities, as may be amended and as summarized in Exhibit "A", which is attached hereto and incorporated herein, and which duties are in addition to those set forth herein.
- 6. DISTRICT, acting through the Appropriate School Official, may report any alleged or suspected criminal acts of students to the Appropriate Law Enforcement Official. 1996 III. Atty. Gen. Op. 96-040. Such criminal activity is intended to include:
 - A. Sale or possession of illegal, controlled substances or other intoxicants;
 - B. Student activity involving weapons, items used as weapons or any impact or destructive device;
 - C. All cases involving gang activity;

- D. Acts of vandalism;
- E. Student activity involving a serious crime or felony, including:
 - i. Forcible felonies as defined in Section 2-8 of the Criminal Code (720 ILCS 5/2-8);
 - ii. Fights or violent activity which might reasonably carry over into the community;
 - iii. Abuse, neglect, lock-out and runaway situations; and
 - iv. Other activities involving students which threaten the safety of students or community members on or off campus.
- 7. Appropriate School Officials shall follow State and federal laws regarding school records. In addition, it is recognized that the reports and other information maintained by law enforcement officers working in the school are not student records. 105 ILCS 10/2(d). Further, for the purpose of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (20 U.S.C. 1232g(a)(4)(B)(ii)), law enforcement officers working in the school shall be considered a law enforcement unit of the school, such that the records maintained by said law enforcement officers are not educational records.
- 8. Section 6(a)(6.5) of the Illinois School Student Records Act (105 ILCS 10/6(a)(6.5)), authorizes DISTRICT to release student record information to law enforcement officers when necessary for the discharge of their official duties prior to adjudication of the student and upon written certification that such records will not be disclosed to any other party, except as provided by law or order of court. In the event that such information is so provided, VILLAGE hereby agrees that all student record information disclosed and communications made under this paragraph are to remain confidential and will not be disclosed to any other party, except as provided by State law or order of court. This provision is intended, among other things, to satisfy the written certification requirement of Section 6(a)(6.5) of the Illinois School Student Records Act and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (20 U.S.C. 1232(g)).
- 9. It is understood that the Stickney Police Department and all Appropriate Law Enforcement Representatives will comply with applicable State and federal law in implementing these procedures and that they may:
 - A. Provide copies of Law Enforcement Records to the Appropriate School Official for persons under 18 years of age, who are enrolled in a school within the DISTRICT, pursuant to Section 1-7(A) when their use is needed for good cause and with an order from the juvenile court, or Section 1-7(A)(8) of the Juvenile Court Act of 1987 (705 ILCS 405/1-7(A)(8)), only if the student has been arrested or taken into custody for one of the following offenses, provided that the Stickney Police Department or officer believes that there is an imminent threat of physical harm to students, school personnel, or others who are present in the school or on school grounds:

- Any violation of Article 24 of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012 (720 ILCS 5/24-1 et seq.);
- ii. A violation of the Illinois Controlled Substance Act (720 ILCS 570/100 et seq.);
- iii. A violation of the Cannabis Control Act (720 ILCS 550/1 et seq.);
- iv. A forcible felony as defined in Section 2-8 of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012 (720 ILCS 5/2-8);
- v. A violation of the Methamphetamine Control and Community Protection Act (720 ILCS 646/1 et seq.);
- vi. A violation of the Sections 26.5-1, 26.5-2 and 26.5-3 of the Harassing and Obscene Communications Act (720 ILCS 5/26.5-0.1 et. seq.);
- vii. A violation of the Hazing Act (720 ILCS 5/12C-50); or
- viii. A violation of Section 12-1, 12-2, 12-3, 12-3.05, 12-3.1, 12-3.2, 12-3.4, 12-3.5, 12-5, 12-7.3, 12-7.4, 12-7.5, 25-1, or 25-5 of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012 (720 ILCS 5/).

The limitations of this paragraph shall be deemed to be expanded or further restricted in accordance with any subsequent amendments to Sections 1-7(8) and/or 5/905(1)(h) of the Juvenile Court Act of 1987 (705 ILCS 405/1-7(8) and/or 405/5-905(1)(h)) or other relevant laws.

The information derived from the law enforcement records shall be kept separate from and shall not become a part of the official school record of that minor student and shall not be a public record. The information shall be used solely by the Appropriate School Official or Officials to aid in the proper rehabilitation of the minor student and to protect the safety of students and employees in the school. If the Appropriate Officials deem it to be in the best interest of the minor student, the student may be referred to in-school or community-based social services if those services are available. Rehabilitation services may include interventions by school support personnel, evaluation for eligibility for special education, referrals to community-based agencies such as youth services, behavioral healthcare service providers, drug and alcohol prevention or treatment programs, and other interventions as deemed appropriate for the student.

Any information provided to Appropriate School Officials whom the school has determined to have a legitimate educational or safety interest by the Stickney Police Department about a minor who is the subject of a current police investigation that is directly related to school safety shall consist of oral information only, and not written law enforcement records, and shall be used solely by the Appropriate School Official or Officials to protect the safety of students and employees in the school and aid in the

- proper rehabilitation of the child. The information derived orally from the Stickney Police Department shall be kept separate from and shall not become a part of the official school record of the student and shall not be a public record.
- B. Provide copies to, or authorize inspection by the Appropriate School Official, pursuant to Section 2.15 of the Freedom of Information Act (5 ILCS 140/2.15), of the following records for persons of 18 years of age or older, who are enrolled in a school within DISTRICT:
 - i. Chronologically maintained arrest information, such as traditional arrest logs or blotters; and
 - ii. The name of the person in custody of the Police Department and the charges for which the person is being held.
- 10. All information disclosed and communications made under this policy are to remain confidential and shall not be disclosed or made available in any form to any other person or agency outside of this Agreement, except as specifically authorized by this Agreement or unless specifically authorized by law.
- 11. The responsibilities of the Appropriate School Officials and Appropriate Law Enforcement Officials under this Agreement shall include providing information pertaining to activities occurring in school, on school grounds, off school grounds, at school-related activities, or by or against school personnel.
- 12. Nothing in this Agreement is intended to limit or restrict the duty and authority of school personnel to request police services for disturbances or other emergencies occurring in or around any of its school buildings, nor is it intended to limit or restrict the duty or ability of any person attending or employed by DISTRICT to provide information or otherwise cooperate in law enforcement investigations, including but not limited to providing witness statements and testimony.
- 13. Where an activity reportable under this Agreement poses an imminent threat to the safety of students or community members, the information will be shared as soon as possible.
- 14. The Illinois Criminal Code and the Juvenile Court Act shall be incorporated herein as a reference for defining any terms in this Agreement.
- 15. It is understood and agreed that neither party to this Agreement shall be legally liable for any negligent or wrongful acts either of commission or omission, chargeable to the other, unless such liability is imposed by law and this Agreement shall not be construed as seeking to enlarge or diminish any obligation or duty owed by one Party against the other Party or against third parties. The parties further agree to indemnify, reimburse and hold each other harmless against any and all liabilities, damages, claims, causes of action, costs, expenses and fees, including attorney fees, that either party incurs arising out of or occurring in connection with the other party's negligent, reckless or intentional misconduct.

16. Any notices required hereunder shall be delivered or served in writing the Parties as follows:

- 17. The agreements, covenants, terms and conditions contained herein may be amended only through written mutual consent of the Parties referencing this Agreement, and a copy of any such written amendment shall be attached to this Agreement.
- 18. This Agreement and any amendments thereto shall become effective when approved and executed by both Parties, and shall remain in effect from year to year thereafter unless either Party takes action to terminate the Agreement.
- 19. Either Party may terminate this Agreement any time during the term by providing the other Party thirty (30) calendar days prior written notice of such termination. The Parties may also terminate this Agreement by written mutual consent.
- 20. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be an original, but all of which shall constitute one and the same instrument.

Exhibit "A"

Additional Duties Imposed by Illinois Statutes

School districts and law enforcement agencies have certain reciprocal reporting duties by statute. These duties are separate from and in addition to any reciprocal reporting duties set forth in the Agreement to which this Exhibit is attached. The following is a list of those duties.

A. DISTRICT duties.

- 1. The Superintendent (or designee) is required to immediately report to the Stickney Police Department, upon receipt of a written complaint from any school personnel, all incidents of battery committed against teachers, teacher personnel, administrative personnel or educational support personnel. 105 ILCS 5/10-21.7. Notification to the Department State Police's Illinois Uniform Crime Reporting Program is required within three days after the occurrence of the attack.
- 2. The building principal (or designee) is required to immediately report to the Stickney Police Department:
 - a) Upon receiving a report from any school official or from any other person that any person, other than a law enforcement official engaged in the conduct of his or her official duties, was observed in possession of a firearm on school grounds. 105 ILCS 5/10-27.1A (a and b).
 - b) Upon receipt of any written, electronic or verbal report from any school personnel regarding a verified incident involving a firearm in a school or on school owned or leased property, including any conveyance owned, leased, or used by the school for the transport of students or school personnel. 105 ILCS 5/10-27.1A(c). Notification to the Department of State Police shall occur in a form, manner and frequency as prescribed by the Department of State Police. Such incidents include possession of a firearm. Firearm is defined in 430 ILCS 65/1.1.
 - c) Upon receipt of any written, electronic or verbal report from any school personnel regarding a verified incident involving drugs (cannabis and narcotic drugs) in a school or on school owned or leased property, including any conveyance owned, leased, or used by the school for the transport of students or school personnel. 105 ILCS 5/10-27.1B. Notification to the Department of State Police shall occur in a form, manner and frequency as prescribed by the Department of State Police.
- 3. The building principal (or designee) is required to report to the Stickney Police Department within 48 hours of becoming aware of any incidents involving violation of Section 5.2 of the Cannabis Control Act and/or Section 401 and Section 407(b) of the Illinois Controlled Substances Act occurring in a school, on the real property comprising any school, on a public way within 1,000 feet of a school, or in any conveyance owned, leased or contracted by a school to transport students to or from school or a school-related activity. 105 ILCS 127/2.

4. The records provided to the DISTRICT by the Stickney Police Department per Section B(1), below, must be kept separate from and not become a part of the official school record of a student. Such records are not a public record, and can be used solely by the building principal, counselors and teachers of the school to aid in the proper rehabilitation of the student and to protect the safety of students and employees in the school. 105 ILCS 5/22-20.

B. Stickney Police Department duties.

1. The Stickney Police Department must report to the building principal of the school whenever a student enrolled there is detained for proceedings under the Juvenile Court Act of 1987, as heretofore and hereafter amended, or for any criminal offense or violation of a municipal or county ordinance. The report must contain the basis for detaining the student, circumstances surrounding the events which led to the student's detention, and status of proceedings. The report shall be updated as appropriate to notify the building principal of developments and the disposition of the matter, 105 ILCS 5/22-20.
