Stickney Community Data Snapshot


The second installment property tax bills will be mailed out on or around November 1st this year with a due date of December 1st, per Cook County

I would just like remind you once again about the Village's Facebook page, "Village of Stickney". Although several Facebook pages mention the Village, there is one official page. Our page is for information only, not for conversations. We will post water main breaks, road closures, upcoming events, and anything that we feel is beneficial information for our residents. The page is monitored and if you have a question or concern, most can be answered in a timely manner. You can "like" the page and follow it and you will get an alert on your page when something is posted. We also make use of Code Red to keep our residents informed. If you haven't signed up already you can do so by calling the Police Department's non-emergency number 708-788-2131.

The Village has a strict solicitation policy. If a company wants to ring doorbells and solicit any kind of business from our residents, they must have a permit. We do a background check on solicitors for all our protection. Seniors, please don't open your door to anyone that you may be suspicious of. Political and Religious organizations are exempt from this policy.

Think Twice Before Tossing Your Leaves!

FALLING LEAVES are a surefire sign that autumn has begun. They can also create headaches for homeowners, between time spent raking, bagging and leaf blowing. But this natural cycle doesn't have to be a nuisance.

When shredded and spread across a landscape, dead leaves infuse the soil with more than a dozen vital nutrients, making them much more effective than synthetic fertilizers. They also insulate the soil, retain moisture,

suppress weeds, and prevent soil compaction.

Tips for Mulching with Leaves

Avoid spreading whole leaves in a thick layer. This will have a negative effect on your soil, blocking out sunlight and trapping water underneath. Small animals like mice or voles might also be attracted to this dense environment. Instead, shred leaves into small dime-sized pieces before spreading them on your soil. You can do so by simply running them over with your lawn mower. You can also use the reverse vacuum function on your leaf blower, shredding them in the process.

An increasingly popular and easy method is buying an electric leaf mulcher. This can generate large amounts of dust and noise, so ear and face protection are recommended.



Flower beds and vegetable gardens will thrive with a 2-inch layer of shredded leaves. Trees and shrubs require a deeper layer, around 4 inches.

If you don't have a garden or trees to mulch, you can leave your shredded mixture directly on your lawn. Blend the leaves well into the base of the grass for best results.

TREE CITY USA



We recently earned our ten-year status of Tree City USA. To qualify as a Tree City USA community, we must meet four standards established by the Arbor Day foundation and the National Association of State Foresters. These standards were established to ensure that every qualifying community would have a viable tree management program and that no community would be excluded because of size.

Tree City USA program has been greening up cities and towns across America since 1976. It is a nationwide movement that provides the framework necessary for communities to manage and expand their public trees.

We here at the Stickney Police Department hope you had a great summer and would like to bring you up to speed on the good things happening since our last newsletter. As you have probably noticed, we have new squads patrolling the Village. During the COVID-19 pandemic, we, as well as other police departments, had a difficult time acquiring police squads from auto makers. Now that we have emerged from the pandemic, squad cars have again become readily available and with the support and approval of the Village Board, we were finally able to purchase and put into service a new

fleet of squad cars and subsequently decided to transition to white squads with new decals in hopes that these new squad cars will offer more visibility while on patrol thus thwarting the potential for criminal acts.



Additionally, On November 1st we transitioned to a totally on-line visitor parking and vacation home watch portal. Instead of affixing a visitor parking placard to their rearview mirror. visitors can now go on the www.VillageofStickney.com website homepage register their vehicle in the portal for permission to park on Village streets between 2:00 am - 6:00 am. The old green or yellow placards previously utilized for visitor parking are no longer valid. Also, residents that are going on vacation and request that the police department watch their house while gone can also go on the www.VillageofStickney.com website to complete the vacation watch form digitally and the police department will watch your residence in your absence. Any resident who does not have access to the internet and/or the ability to complete the visitor parking or vacation watch portal can call the police department at 708-788-2131 option 9 and our desk officer will take your information and enter it into the respective portal on your behalf.

Furthermore, we would like to remind residents that they can submit NOT IN PROGRESS community concerns via Tip411. Tip411 is a totally anonymous tip reporting platform that residents can utilize to

provide information about crime or any other Village concern. Tip411 can be accessed on the Village's website at: www.VillageofStickney.com or via the Tip411 application. Please do not submit in progress incidents via Tip411. We would also like remind you to follow the Stickney Police Department on Facebook to receive all updates.

In conclusion, please report all suspicious activities in your neighborhood.....see something say something! No law enforcement agency can function effectively without the concerned assistance of responsible citizens. We are depending on you to call and tell us whenever you observe suspicious persons or actions and always be aware of your surroundings! From the Desk of Fire Chief, JEFFREY BOYAJIAN

The Stickney Fire Department has been busy in 2023 upgrading equipment and the facility. We were able to accomplish this through a \$150,000 grant received from the Illinois Department of Economic Opportunity. Here are some key items the grant has allowed us to purchase:

- 1. Pneumatic Lifting Bags
- 2. Vehicle Stabilization Struts
- 3. HVAC System for a portion of the fire house
- 4. 16 sets of Turnout Gear (PPE)
- 5. Many other small equipment items

We have purchased a new Utility Task Vehicle (UTV) for use at special events and can respond to emergencies in rough terrain. This unit is equipped with the capability to transport a patient to an awaiting ambulance. This unit also has a plow attachment to assist with snow clearing around the firehouse.

Working alongside Mayor Walik and the Board of Trustees we have placed the order for a new 107' Pierce Aerial Ladder which should be delivered in late 2024 or early 2025, which is a significant step forward. It will replace



the 1997 Ladder truck, which was retired last year, ensuring the department has the latest and most advanced firefighting equipment.

Its worth noting that the Stickney Fire Department is on track to handle approximately 1200-1300 calls in 2023 which is a substantial workload, encompassing ambulance, fire, service, and rescue calls.

The efforts to keep our equipment and training up-to-date and effectively respond to emergencies demonstrate a commitment to public safety and service to the residents of the Village of Stickney.

The month of October is Fire Prevention Month, and we were out visiting schools again teaching the students about fire safety while cooking. This year's theme for Fire Prevention Week is "Cooking Safety Starts with YOU. Pay Attention to Fire Prevention".

From the Desk of Director of Public Works, JOE LOPEZ

Leaf Pickup

Leaf Pick up will run the last week of October through the first week of December on Mondays and Tuesdays only. Leaves should be placed along the curb on the parkway. **DO NOT PUT LEAVES IN THE STREET. This program is only for leaves.**

Do not put plants, branches, grass, dog feces in with the leaves. Follow

the street sweeping signs on your block.

Monday: The North and West side (even side) Tuesday: The South and East side (odd side)

Vehicles may not be parked from 8:00am until your street is cleared of leaves - in front of your residence on the day of the designated pick up. All violators will be ticketed and towed.

Yard waste pick up ended on November 30th.

Leaves cannot be burned in the Village.

Snow Removal

Parking restrictions will be in place if there are 2 or more inches of snow. Follow the parking signs that are posted on every block that reflects the restrictions. Parking tickets will be issued for any violations.

Snow Removal Hours: 8:00am - 11:00pm

Alleys are plowed if there is more than 6" of snow. We are not responsible if snow rolls over on your apron. Also, the Village is **NOT** responsible for rollover snow on driveways or sidewalks from snowplowing. Do not put snow back on the street.

Ways to Prevent Frozen Pipes

Disconnect garden hoses. After you finish <u>tending to your garden for the season</u>, disconnect, drain, and store your hoses. Close any shut-off valves that supply outdoor hose bibs and open the faucet outside to drain the line. Keep it open throughout the winter to allow space for any water that remains in the pipe to expand. Consider using <u>faucet covers</u>.

Insulate your pipes: Pipe insulation is fairly inexpensive and <u>widely available at home improvement stores</u>. Consider insulating any pipes located in unheated areas, such as in the attic, basement, crawl spaces, or garage. In extreme cold, pipes underneath kitchen and bathroom sinks are also vulnerable to freezing. Apply foam insulation liberally to provide a buffer against frigid temperatures.

Seal any air leaks: Inspect your home for any cracks or openings that could let in cold air. Seal any holes around the piping in interior or exterior walls and the sill plates,
